

The Town of Arlington *An Historical Summary*

The land currently known as Arlington originally belonged to the Chickasaw Indians. In 1818, a Treaty with the Chickasaw ceded this land, along with other land in West Tennessee, to the United States. On November 24, 1819, Shelby County was established and named after Isaac Shelby, who was one of the commissioners of the Treaty with the Chickasaw, a Revolutionary War Veteran and the first governor of Kentucky. During this time, the community consisted of fewer than 20 settlers.

By 1856, the community had grown to around 200. Agriculture was predominant in the area, and a method of shipping was essential. As a result, Withe Depot was constructed on land donated by General Samuel J. Hays. Served by the Memphis & Ohio Railroad, the primary shipment was cotton and its purpose was to attract shipping to the Fayette County community of Withe. Because of this generous donation of land by General Hays, the community was named Haysville.

The railroad also played a significant role in the town's transportation history. One train, affectionately named "The Accomodation" by the passengers, would carry them from Arlington to Memphis for work and school. It is told that the train's engineer, flagman, and conductor knew the passengers who rode daily, and if they were late, would slow down the train to wait for them. They would blow the whistle and watch the people come running out of their homes to hop on the train!

Haysville continued its growth until the Civil War, when men answered the call to fight the war. Many never returned.

In 1872, the land surrounding Withe Depot owned by the Estate of General Hays was laid off, and the lots sold at public sale. The streets were named for prominent citizens such as, Quintard, to honor Bishop Quintard of the Episcopal Church; Jackson, to honor President Jackson; Brown, for Mr. Brown who gave the land for the Cumberland Presbyterian Church; Chester, for Colonel Robert I. Chester; Forrest, for General Forrest; and Greenlee, for Ephriam E. Greenlee. The area's first house was built by depot agent, Captain Henry Munger Pitman.

proudly boasted its own steam saw mill, grist mill, steam cotton gin, livery stable, stores, and four churches. By the end of the 19th Century, the town had added a post office, physician, druggist, lumber store, meat market, and an undertaker.

In 1900, with a population of around 600, the Town of Arlington was incorporated. Some of the early citizens to serve as Mayor were Will Taylor, Charles McAuley, C.W. Bond, Sam Tucker Wilson, and Jimmy Henry.


The Town of Arlington is proud of its history, preserving historic landmarks

such as the Rachel H.K. Burrows Museum, S.Y. Wilson & Company, the Blacksmith Shop, the Historic Post Office, and a replica built in 2003 of the original railroad depot station of the 1800s which serves the community as the Arlington Senior Citizens Center. There are a number of residential structures still in existence that have historic value and preserve the architectural style of the era.

Throughout the years, Depot Square has played host to civic events such as the annual "Brunswick

Stew" town reunion, and more recently, events such as Arlington in April, Music on the Square, Harvest Gathering, and the Christmas Parade.

Throughout its history, Arlington has met the challenge of blending old and new. The Association for the Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities (APTA), chartered in 1979, continues its work in preserving several historical structures and sites in Arlington. Today's leaders are tasked with providing its citizens with the modern conveniences and infrastructure they require, all the while, preserving the influences of the past that make Arlington unique.

Haysville was incorporated on the 10th day of February, 1878. W. B. Nolley served as Mayor, followed by H.Y. Marley, Dr. J.P. Bone, W.I. Hooks, and C.C. Poole. During this time, an outbreak of yellow fever prompted the town fathers to quarantine Haysville. Outsiders were not allowed to enter in an attempt to mitigate the spread of the deadly fever.

In 1883, town leaders wanted to establish a post office. However, a "Haysville" post office already existed in Tennessee. Captain Henry Pitman suggested that the town change its name to "Arlington," after Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. The population stood at 500, and the town

TOWN STAFF

Catherine Durant, Town

Administrator – Ms. Durant is responsible for the overall management of the Town of Arlington's departments and operations. She provides leadership and guidance to all departments in implementing the Board of Mayor and Aldermen's direction in meeting the needs of the Town and its residents.

Kevin Carter, Parks & Recreation

Director – Mr. Carter's responsibilities include the development of the Town's parks and recreation programs, long-term planning, and management of the park facilities and special events.

Christine Conwell, Librarian

– Ms. Conwell implements the programs, clubs, and events at the Town's Sam T. Wilson Public Library, and she manages the library staff and volunteers. Check the Town of Arlington website for a list of monthly events.

David Franks, Fire Chief

– Chief Franks is responsible for the administration of fire and emergency services and implements emergency management operations for the Town of Arlington. He also serves as the Town's Safety Officer.

Brittney Owens, Town Recorder and

Treasurer – Ms. Owens is responsible for the fiscal operations of the Town which include budgeting, billing, collections, financial reporting, payroll, and human resources. The Town Recorder is the custodian of records for Arlington.

Terry Perkins, Wastewater Manager

– Mr. Perkins supervises the Town of Arlington industrial pretreatment program, wastewater treatment plant and collection system.

Angela Reeder, Town Planner

– Ms. Reeder administers the Town's residential and non-residential development regulations and is responsible for the Town's long-range planning for land use. She also enforces the Town's property maintenance regulations.

Betty Russell, Senior Citizens Center

Director – Mrs. Russell directs and manages the operations and activities of the Arlington Senior Citizens Center, which serves the Senior Citizens of our community.

Public Works Director (currently open)

– The person in this role supervises the maintenance of the Town's roads and drainage infrastructure and all Town facilities, specifically managing streets, solid waste, building maintenance, equipment maintenance, codes, subdivision inspection, and storm water.

Board and Commission Meeting Dates for the Town of Arlington

• **The Arlington Board of Mayor and Aldermen** meets the first Monday of each month.

• **The Arlington Planning Commission** meets the third Monday of each month.

• **The Design Review Committee** meets the second Tuesday of the month.

Arlington Boasts Lowest Property Taxes in Shelby County!

With a rate of \$1.15 per \$100 of assessed value, Arlington's tax rate is \$0.35 lower than the next lowest Shelby County suburb (at \$1.40). Much credit to our Mayor, Aldermen, and Town staff for their fiscally sound work leading our community!

PROUD to SERVE

The Shelby County Sheriff's Office (SCSO), under the leadership of Shelby County Sheriff Bill Oldham, is a full-service law enforcement agency and the pre-trial custodial keeper of those who are charged with crimes. It is the mission of the Shelby County Sheriff's Office to protect the lives and property of the citizens of Shelby County, Tennessee, to preserve the peace, to maintain a safe and secure jail and to prevent crime and disorder while constantly guarding personal liberties as prescribed by law. And while they serve all residents of Shelby County, with the substation in Arlington, there is a real concentration, both in number and focus, in our community – which is a great benefit to Arlington.

The Arlington Sheriff's substation is home to the Uniform Patrol Field Bureau, the Traffic/ Patrol Support Services Division, the Reducing Impaired Distracted Driving Unit (R.I.D.D, formerly Metro D.U.I), and some elements of the Community Operations Bureau, which includes crime prevention and the School Resource Officers. The Sheriff's Office Vehicle Maintenance facility is located on the substation property in Arlington.

"We share a solid working relationship with the Town of Arlington," explains Lt. Terry Lomax. "It is my privilege each month to report on SCSO activities in the Town to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen at their monthly meetings. The Town of Arlington benefits greatly from the substation's location in Arlington; more than that, our officers, many of whom live in Arlington, are proud of the partnership we have locally."

The SCSO is over the School Resource Officers (SROs) that serve in the schools in Shelby County, including Arlington Community Schools. Lt. Dallas Lavergne and Lt. Clay Aiken lead the SROs in Arlington with a goal of law enforcement, mentoring, and counseling ACS students. Two officers are assigned to Arlington High School and one officer serves at Arlington Middle School. "Our goal for placing officers in the schools is not only to protect the students and faculty," says Lt. Lavergne, "But also to build relationships with the community. Our school resource officers contribute much to the schools they serve in addition to helping to keep them safe." By example and education, these officers demonstrate the



dangers associated with drugs and alcohol, criminal activity, and other anti-social behavior.



The Train Depot

Transportation Hub



A train depot for the Memphis and Ohio Railroad (1856) was built in 1860 on land given by General Samuel Jackson Hays for the depot. The building consisted of a large freight room at the west end, the agent's office in the middle, and two small waiting rooms at the east end; it was surrounded by a platform. For many years, this depot, known as Wythe Depot (and as Withe Depot) was the heart of the surrounding community. The first depot agent, Captain Henry Munger Pitman, built the first house in the community.

The Memphis and Ohio line ran from Memphis to Paris, Tennessee. In 1872, the Memphis and Ohio Railroad became part of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad which merged into CSX Railroad in 1986. The CSX Railroad operates the line that currently runs through Arlington.

The depot served the shipping needs of surrounding businesses and farms and the needs of citizens of the community. Before gravel roads were improved and automobiles were more commonplace, the train was the primary means of transportation for those traveling to Memphis for work, school, shopping, or the MidSouth Fair. The train known as "The Accomodation" arrived at the depot twice a day, 6:45am and 6:45pm. Those riding the train regularly to work or school could purchase a book of tickets at \$10 per month instead of higher-priced daily tickets.

The train depot was the site of a major annual community gathering in August called Brunswick Stew. Many came to town with garden and pantry goods to participate in the cooking, renew friendships, and eat! Large black cauldrons of stew were prepared outdoors and served at the platform of the depot. It was an annual town reunion. The idea for the event originated from Mr. Jasper Brockwell ca. 1930. The event was featured in *The Nashville Tennessean Magazine*, September 21, 1952.

As trains and the need for transportation by train changed, so did the depot. When diesel engines replaced steam engines, the water tank located between the tracks and the pump house in the current parking lot on Mott Street was no longer needed and was torn down in 1955. The tank had a metal spout on an arm so the spout could be swung to the train engine to fill it and then swung back out of the way. The pump house is still present in the parking lot.

Changes in the need for train transportation eventually led to the closing of depots. Arlington's depot closed in 1969. Chester Sealand was depot agent at the time. He was preceded by Charles Farmer who was Arlington's depot agent from 1960 to 1968. The depot was demolished in 1971.

A replica of the original train depot was constructed in 2003 on the original site of the depot. This new building is Arlington's Senior Citizens Center. The original blueprints of the old depot were used when plans were drawn for the new building. Although trains do not stop at the replica of the old depot, they pass by each day. Those who live near the depot site can still hear and feel the train passing through town.

Community Senior Center

The Arlington Senior Citizens Center opened in the fall of 2003 to serve as a gathering place for Arlington's Seniors, ages 50+. The building is a replica of Arlington's original railroad depot from the late 1800's, and just as the old depot was a hub of activity then - the Center is a hub of activity for Arlington's seasoned residents.

Mrs. Betty Russell, the director at the Center since 2006, says, "Seniors are such a fun group to work with, because they are so appreciative." And it is easy to see why Arlington's seniors are a grateful bunch, with monthly activities, ranging from bingo to balance exercises, pot lucks to picnics, scrapbooking to sing a-longs, coffees to quilting - there is something for everyone!

On February 27, 1979, a special meeting occurred at the home of Ellen Davies Rodgers in Brunswick. Women concerned about continued loss of historic structures in Arlington had sought Mrs. Rodgers' help in forming a chapter of the Association for the Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities (APTA), a statewide non-profit organization established in 1951 with a mission of preserving the heritage of Tennessee. At the meeting, 15 of the group were chosen to be the founding members

of an Arlington Chapter. Mrs. Rodgers sent a letter to the APTA supporting the formation of the Arlington Chapter. With approval by the Executive Committee of the APTA (April 1979) and the APTA Board of Directors (May 1979), the Arlington Chapter of the APTA was chartered on May 21, 1979.

The newly chartered Arlington Chapter held its first meeting on June 26, 1979, at the Arlington Branch Library (on Walker Street) and elected its first officers, set a regular meeting day and time, and set annual membership dues. The members of the Arlington Chapter began work on the first of many fundraisers to raise money for preservation projects. Their first project was leasing and restoring the building at the south corner of Chester and Walker streets—the Rachel H. K. Burrow Museum, now operated by the Arlington Chapter.

Other preservation projects of the Arlington Chapter were the Historic Post Office, the Harrell Farm Log Cabin, the Blacksmith Shop, and the Holy Innocents Cemetery. In addition to these projects, the Arlington Chapter developed and sponsored the following current community events: Arlington in April (1994-2005) which has become a major annual Town event; Memorial Day Service at Arlington Cemetery (since 2002); Independence Day Celebration (4th of July event since 2002); and Harvest Gathering at Depot Square. The historic sites are open for visitation at regular hours or by appointment, and one or more are open during various community events.

The Chapter meets monthly to plan their activities and work on activities and projects. If you are interested in joining the Arlington Chapter or for more information, see the APTA page on the Town website (www.townofarlington.org) or e-mail Arlington_Chapter_APTA@comcast.net.

The Holy Innocents Cemetery

The Holy Innocents Cemetery was established in 1881 with the burial of a young child. The Holy Innocents Church was built on the property in 1882. The lumber for the building was virgin hardwood timber from land adjacent to the Loosahatchie River and was cut at a local sawmill. In 1883, Ephraim Edward and Sarah Louisa Butler Greenlee deeded the one-acre lot with the church building and the graveyard to the "Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Tennessee," reserving the right for themselves and their family to be buried on the property.

Others in the community were buried in the cemetery because it was the only cemetery in town until 1909 when the Arlington Cemetery was established. Members of some of the founding families of Arlington are buried in the Holy Innocents Cemetery. The last burial in the cemetery occurred in 1987. The church building was dismantled in 1929, and some of the lumber was used to improve other buildings in the community. In 2003, the Diocese of West Tennessee deeded the property to the APTA.

Rachel H. K. Burrow Museum

The Rachel H. K. Burrow Museum is located in Depot Square on the corner of Chester and Walker streets. The building was built as a bank (Arlington Bank and Trust Company) in 1905. Following the closing of the bank in the early 1930s, the building was used as a community center where Miss Sarah Robinson taught dancing to the children of the community. Later, Mrs. Mabel Williams Hughes used the building for her headquarters when she was President of the Tennessee Congress of Parents and Teachers (1936-1939) and President of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers (1946-1949).

Dr. Malcolm A. Baker came to Arlington in January 1952 and used this building for his medical office. After he moved his office, the first library in Arlington was started in the building (1957); the library was open each week on Thursday afternoon.




In 1960, Mayor C. W. Bond and the Board of Aldermen started using the building for the Town Hall. The town vacated the building in 1980 after the new (and current) Town Hall on Airline Road was dedicated. The Arlington Chapter of the APTA leased the building from the Town in 1980. After restoration, the building was dedicated in November 1982 as the Rachel H. K. Burrow Museum in honor of Mrs. Rachel H. K. Burrow, Town historian and charter member of the Arlington Chapter.

Harrell Farm Log Cabin

The Harrell Farm Log Cabin (ca. mid-1800s) was used as the cook's house on the Harrell farm since before the turn of the century. When the family of William Jacob and Addie LaRue Harrell, II, moved from the farm into town in 1921, they also moved the log cabin to their new home on Forrest Street (the Bone House built in 1877 by Dr. James P. Bone). At its new location in town, the cabin continued to be the cook's house for many years.

In 1991, Miss Addie Lee Harrell, who still lived in the house on Forrest Street, decided to have the little cabin burned by the Town's fire department to get rid of the cabin as well as to give our volunteer firemen "practice." The cabin was saved at the last minute by a member of the Arlington Chapter. Members of the Chapter and others dismantled the cabin, numbering each log. The numbered logs were put back together, placing the cabin at its current site on Chester Street.



Blacksmith Shop

The Blacksmith Shop is a reconstruction of the original building that was on this site until 1991 when it collapsed. The original blacksmith shop was owned and operated by Alonzo W. Acred for many years. The Masonic Lodge of Arlington, founded in 1908, used the second floor of the blacksmith shop as their meeting hall until they built their own building in 1947. Mr. Acred, the blacksmith at that time, was a charter member of the Masonic Lodge of Arlington. Mr.



Acred sold the shop to S.Y. Wilson and Co. which operated the shop until its closure in 1971.

Plans for restoration of the original building had been initiated before its collapse. After the collapse, wood from the old building was saved for the restoration project. However, the wood was lost when an arsonist burned the building where the wood was stored. The property was donated to the Arlington Chapter in 1999 by Sam T. Wilson. Reconstruction of the building began that year and was completed in 2000.

The forge, completed in 2003, is one of the few working forges in Tennessee. The Arlington Chapter of the APTA owns and operates the Blacksmith Shop. Blacksmithing tools, farm tools and equipment, and more are on display. Demonstrations of blacksmithing are given during special openings of the shop.

Historic Post Office



The Historic Post Office, the first post office building in Arlington, was originally located in the row of businesses (built in 1895-1920) facing the railroad track. This building was donated by Stanley D. and Elizabeth C. Osborne to the Town of Arlington, in 1984 and was moved from the back of the Osborne's

store building on the north corner of Chester and Forrest streets to its present site. The Osborne's store was originally built and owned by C. C. Keathley who purchased the old post office building and moved it from the north side of the railroad tracks to the back of his store. Mr. Keathley lived in the old post office building while he operated his store.

The Arlington Chapter moved the old post office building to its present location and restored the building which was dedicated on June 30, 1991. The Historic Post Office is operated by the Arlington Chapter and displays postal history of the community and memorabilia honoring local veterans.



Historic Depot Square

The heart of Arlington is the historic Depot Square. The Square is home to many of the Town's historic buildings, the replica of the old train depot – and S.Y. Wilson & Company has been the centerpiece since 1893. S.Y. Wilson, which was held by one family for 122 years, was recently reborn under new owners as a “general store for an active life.” But that’s not all...several eateries, shops, and businesses call Depot Square home, as well as, an active bootcamp for fitness enthusiasts. Much of the Square is walkable...and all of it is enjoyable!

Arlington Designated Tennessee Downtowns Community

Arlington's pride in its historic district is evident. Arlington is a Tennessee Downtowns community, named by the State of Tennessee. The Tennessee Downtowns program is designed to assist communities preserve and revitalize their historic commercial areas, such as Arlington's Historic Depot Square. Selected in 2014, Arlington was one of six communities in Tennessee to receive this designation, and the only community in West Tennessee to be selected that year. "Being a Tennessee Downtowns community has bolstered the interest in the historic area and provided tools to bring people to the heart of our community. Arlington's roots are in Depot Square, and preserving that gem is important to our residents," said Mayor Mike Wissman.

The award provided the community the opportunity to work with staff from the National Main Street Program on the four points that they believe makes a Main Street: economic restructuring, organization, design, and promotion. The award also included a grant that will be used to market Depot Square to area residents and visitors, highlighting the special places in Depot Square and bringing people to experience the area. Today, Arlington is one of the fastest growing communities in the State of Tennessee, but the small town charm has remained. Visitors can spend the day in Depot Square by admiring the preservation and replica construction of historic buildings, visiting the small businesses located in Arlington, or attending one of the many community events the Town offers.

Tennessee's Memphis Regional Mega-site

Located “just up the road” from Arlington on Interstate 40 at Exit 42, Tennessee’s 4,100 acre Memphis Regional Megasite is the state’s commitment to bringing world-class jobs to our area. With an investment to-date of \$106 million in infrastructure, this state-owned, premier industrial site is the best available certified site in North America. The site’s location just 45 minutes from Memphis International Airport, with ready access to seven major highways, two major ports, and five Class 1 railroads, makes it ideally situated – and importantly, ideally situated for Arlington.

Clearing all obstacles included acquiring the land with frontage on I-40 and access to rail, improving I-40’s Exit 42 interchange, rerouting State Route 222, constructing a water tower on site, and conducting all required environmental studies. The state of Tennessee is now involved in an aggressive marketing campaign to offer the site as build-ready to the world’s largest industries, with the goal of attracting manufacturers that will bring dozens of complimentary suppliers to support the site.

With Arlington’s designations as Best City in Tennessee to Raise a Family, Best City for Young Families in Tennessee, and Best City for Homeownership in Tennessee – and our location just 20 miles from the mega-site - Arlington will be an attractive community for families to locate. Arlington’s business community also stands to expand and grow from the opportunities to support a major high-tech industrial site.





Loosahatchie Greenway


The Loosahatchie Greenway Master Plan was adopted by the Arlington Board of Mayor and Aldermen in July, 2014. The Master Plan creates a roadmap for the development of over 21 miles of new greenway trail for the Town of Arlington's residents and visitors.

This plan is a long-term comprehensive

master plan outlining a future network of on and off-road bicycle and pedestrian trails. The trails will connect town parks, municipal buildings, Historic Depot Square, schools, and neighborhoods within Arlington, as well as provide connections to our neighboring communities.

This is a long term plan for development, and construction is dependent on funding and land acquisition.

The Town of Arlington received an Outstanding Planning Award for the Loosahatchie Greenway Master Plan from the Tennessee Chapter of the American Planning Association





A Very Successful First Year

A very successful opening of the schools and remarkable academic achievement characterized the first year for the Arlington Community School district. Academic operations began in August 2014. The first goal, doing the groundwork so that parents and students would see as little change or disruption as possible, was achieved.

The first year was marked by the system receiving top honors from the state. Arlington Community Schools was named an Exemplary District, one of only twelve districts statewide to be so recognized. Additionally, both Arlington Elementary and Donelson Elementary were named as Reward Schools for academic achievement, the highest honor the state bestows on individual schools. Both our other schools, Arlington High School and Arlington Middle School, were rated in the top five percent by independent rating services. The 2015 senior

class at Arlington High School received over \$30 million in scholarship awards, an all time high.

The School Board and Administration have ambitious goals for the 2015-2016 school year. In an effort to further student-focused academic achievement, 2015 will reflect initial offerings in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) courses. ACS is also

upgrading its technology infrastructure necessary to implement a 1:1 program to put electronic devices in the hands of students at the Middle and High Schools.

With financial support from the Town of Arlington, The Fine Arts program at AHS is evaluating opening a community television station within the next two years. Additional plans at the High School include replacing the current football field with artificial turf and upgrading our track and field facilities.

In addition to the above initiatives, enhanced academic offerings will be contingent on the needs of the students in Honors and Advanced Placement courses, Dual Enrollment college courses, World language offerings, and increased opportunities for students to experience and use the latest technology.




